Mozart-Hall

Accessibility:

Both concert halls are accessible by elevator. Accessible toilets are available on the ground floor.

Public Transportation:

U-Bahn (Subway) line U4 (Station Stadtpark), Tram lines D, 2, and 71 (Station Schwarzenbergplatz), Bus lines 2a and 4a. The central station Karlsplatz is approximately 700 meters away.

Arrival by Coach:

The Vienna Konzerthaus is located in a short-term parking zone. Parking is subject to charges on weekdays from 9:00 am to 10:00 pm and is allowed for two hours. Buses can generally stop in front of the Konzerthaus.

NATIONAL LIBRARY

Aurum



Founded in the 18th century, the Austrian National Library is not only one of Europe's oldest libraries but also an architectural masterpiece and a priceless cultural center. Its magnificent baroque-style rooms house an extensive collection of books, manuscripts, maps, and other historical artifacts reflecting the rich history of Austria and Europe. Since its inception, the National Library has inspired generations of scholars, writers, and researchers, remaining a site of intellectual discovery and cultural exchange.

The concerts take place in the Aurum, which with its unique vaulted architecture, provides splendid acoustics and a distinctive atmosphere.

Accessibility:

Access points, stairs, and exits within the premises are largely equipped with handrails, handrail continuations, step edge markings, step endings, and tactile attention fields to ensure as barrier-free a visit as possible.

Trams 1, 2, 71, D – Stop Burgring

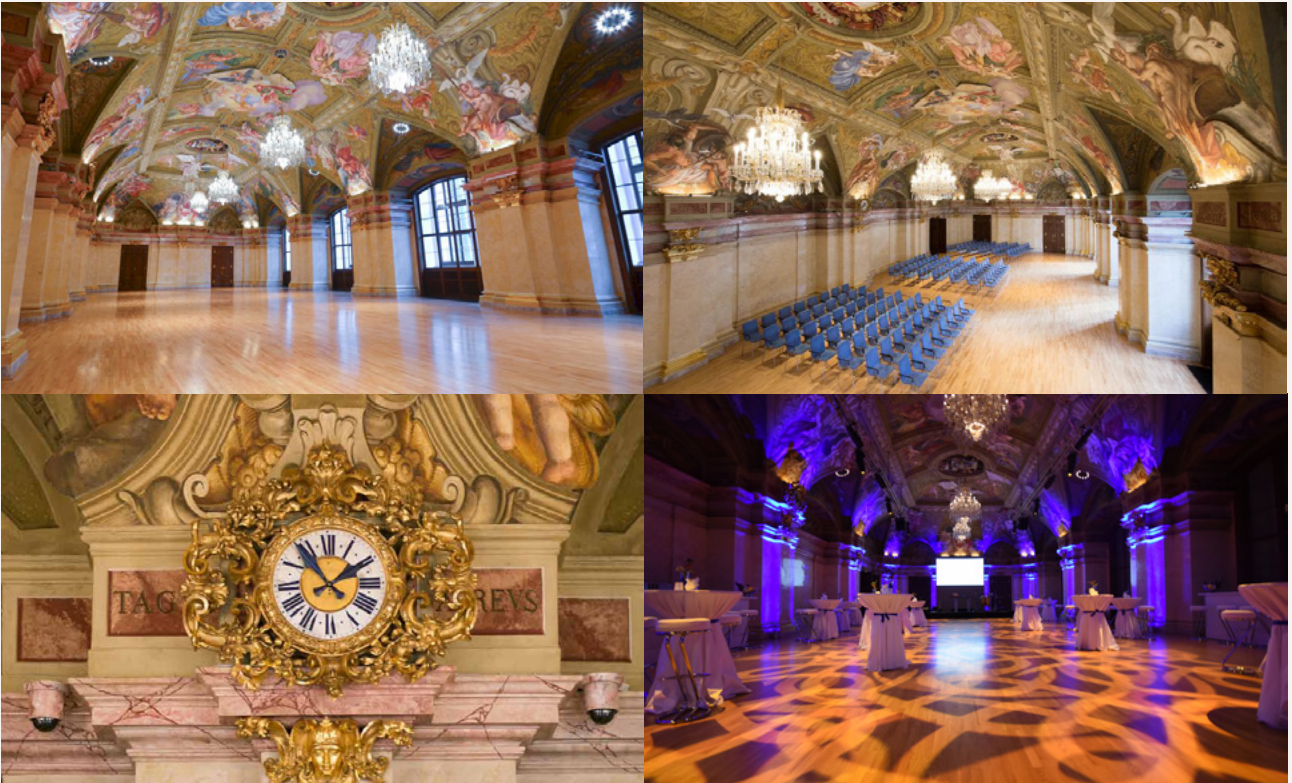

PALAIS
NIEDERÖSTERREICH

Landtagsaal



The Palais Niederösterreich, a stately building in the heart of Vienna, is a symbol of the opulent history of the Austrian monarchy. Constructed in the 16th century in Renaissance style, it once served as a residence for nobles and high-ranking officials. Over the centuries, the palace has undergone numerous alterations and renovations, further enhancing its architectural beauty and historical significance.

At the core of this historic city palace is the Landtagssaal, which doubles as the house's concert hall. Particularly noteworthy are the impressive wall paintings, as the Landtagssaal houses the largest continuous ceiling fresco in Austria, providing a unique setting for splendid cultural evenings.

Accessibility:

The event location is accessible, with an elevator providing direct access to the Landtagssaal.

Arrival by Public Transport:

U3 Herrengasse / U2 and various tram lines at Schottentor (approximately 600 meters away), 1A, 2A Michaelerplatz. The nearest taxi stand is at Am Hof.

Arrival by Bus:

Boarding and alighting point: 1st district, Josef-Meinrad-Platz.

PALAIS FERSTEL

Großer Ferstelsaal



The Palais Ferstel, an imposing building in the heart of Vienna, is an architectural gem from the Gründerzeit era that embodies the splendid history of the Austrian capital. Erected in the late 19th century in the Neo-Renaissance style, the palace once served as a trading exchange and was named after its builder, Heinrich von Ferstel. With its impressive facade, elegant interior spaces, and historical charm, the Palais Ferstel is a popular destination for visitors from around the world who wish to explore Vienna's rich cultural heritage. The concerts take place in the Grand Ferstel Hall, which is the architectural highlight of the city palace.

Strauchgasse 4, 1010 Vienna

Accessibility:

Barrier-free access is available on Strauchgasse. An elevator will take you directly to the banquet hall from there. A barrier-free restroom is also located there.

Arrival by Public Transport:

U3 Herrengasse / U2 and various tram lines at Schottentor (approximately 600 meters away), 1A, 2A Michaelerplatz. The nearest taxi stand is at Am Hof.

Arrival by Bus:

Boarding and alighting point: Burgring 5 or Josef-Meinrad-Platz

SOFIENSÄLE

Großer Festsaal



The Viennese Sofiensäle, named after Archduchess Sophie, mother of Emperor Franz Joseph I, have a rich and illustrious history. The opening in 1847 was celebrated with a ball under the direction of Johann Strauss I.

Shortly thereafter, the grand hall became the central venue for dance events and classical concerts - with the „Waltz King“ Johann Strauss II personally presenting nearly 100 of his works here. After a devastating fire, the Sofiensäle were lovingly restored several years ago and now shine once again in their Secessionist glory.

Accessibility:

The main entrance is wheelchair accessible. An elevator takes you to the ballroom, where you will also find accessible restrooms.

Arrival by Public Transport:

Subway: U3, U4 Landstraße-Wien Mitte, Tram: 1, O Marxergasse, Bus: 4A Löwengasse, 74A Weyrgasse

Train: S1, S2, S3, S4, S7 Wien-Mitte

Arrival by Bus:

Boarding and alighting point: Marxergasse 17
